

# ***“Pakistan – Four Futures for a Troubled Relationship”***

**Pakistan is a critical American ally in its efforts to combat global terrorism. It has a large army, a significant nuclear arsenal, and a long - if troubled - history of alliance with the United States. Nevertheless, America's relations with Pakistan are difficult - a fact brought home by the killing of Osama Bin Laden in a compound only thirty miles from Pakistan's capital. As the U.S. re-examines its policies in South Asia, including a possible withdrawal from Afghanistan and a growing friendship with India, the U.S. also needs to consider its relationship with Pakistan and Pakistan's future. Professor Timothy Hoyt of the U.S. Naval War College will lay out four different possible futures for Pakistan, and lead a discussion of how the U.S. can best contribute to Pakistani stability and development in the coming decades.**

**Timothy D. Hoyt** is a Professor of Strategy and Policy and the John Nicholas Brown Chair of Counterterrorism Studies at the U.S. Naval War College. He is the author of over thirty articles and book chapters on U.S. relations with India and Pakistan, on the Indo-Pakistani conventional and nuclear military balance, and on broader security issues in the South Asian region. He has briefed Congress and the U.S. Joint Staff on Pakistani security issues, and is a founding member of the U.S. Naval War College's Indian Ocean Studies Group - one of the few organizations that study the Indian Ocean as a unique and unified political system.
